S&P 500 Systematic Mean Reversion Tactical Allocator Index Methodology

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Introduction

Index Objective and Highlights

The S&P 500 Systematic Mean Reversion Tactical Allocator (SMRT) Index implements a mean reversion factor to determine the dynamic leverage on the S&P 500 PR. The factor is based on the index level at market close and the index's exponential weighted moving average (EWMA), the factor is adjusted by volatility to determine leverage and subtracts a funding rate from the leverage portion.

This methodology was created by S&P Dow Jones Indices to achieve the aforementioned objective of measuring the underlying interest of each index governed by this methodology document. Any changes to or deviations from this methodology are made in the sole judgment and discretion of S&P Dow Jones Indices so that the index continues to achieve its objective.

Index Construction

Index Calculations

At the end of each trading day, the index compares the current S&P 500 price return index level to the exponential weighted moving average of the index level¹ to determine the mean reverting factor. The index multiplies this factor by a *t-1* volatility observation to determine leverage.

The index applies a leverage multiplier of 350. Leverage is capped at 100% and floored at -50%. The index calculates in excess return terms with the effective fed funds rate (EFFR) as the funding rate.

For each index calculation day, the index calculates as follows:

$$Index_{t} = Index_{t-1} * \left[1 + (1 + L_{t-1}) * \left(\frac{SPX_{t}}{SPX_{t-1}} - 1 - R_{t-1} * \frac{ACT}{360} \right) \right]$$

where:

 L_{t-1} = Leverage Factor on calculation day t-1

 R_{t-1} = Effective Fed Funds Rate on calculation day t-1

 SPX_t = S&P 500 price return index level on day t

ACT = Actual number of calendar days between current day and last trading day

For each index calculation day, the leverage factor calculates as follows:

$$L_t = \min\left(1.0, \max\left(-0.5, 350 * \left(\frac{EWMA_{t-1}}{SPX_t} - 1\right) * Vol_{t-1}\right)\right)$$

where:

 $EWMA_t$ = S&P 500 price return index level exponential weighted moving average on day t

 Vol_t = The estimated volatility of the S&P 500 price return index on day t

For each index calculation day, the exponential weighted moving average of the S&P 500 price return index level calculates as follows:

$$EWMA_t = \lambda_{SPX} * EWMA_{t-1} + (1 - \lambda_{SPX}) * SPX_t$$

where:

 $EWMA_0$ = S&P 500 price return index level on initial observation date

$$\lambda_{SPX} = 0.5^{\frac{1}{1.5}}$$
 Decay Factor

For each index calculation day, the volatility of the S&P 500 price return index level calculates as follows:

$$Var_{t} = \lambda_{vol} Var_{t-1} + (1 - \lambda_{vol}) \left[\ln \left(\frac{SPX_{t}}{SPX_{t-1}} \right) \right]^{2}$$

$$Vol_{t} = \sqrt{Var_{t} * 252}$$

¹ The index uses an EWMA of Index Level with a Lambda of 0.6299 (λ_{SPX}) and EWMA Volatility with a Lambda of 0.9828 (λ_{vol})

where:

 Var_0 = Variance used for volatility calculation on initial observation date.²

 $\lambda_{vol} = 0.5^{\frac{1}{40}}$

Index Maintenance

Rebalancing

The indices rebalance daily. Leverage is evaluated daily at the close of each trading day and effective prior to the open of the next trading day.

Currency of Calculation and Additional Index Return Series

The indices calculate in U.S. dollars.

WMR foreign exchange rates are taken daily at 4:00 PM London Time and used in the calculation of the indices. These mid-market fixings are calculated by WMR based on LSEG data and appear on LSEG pages.

In addition to the indices detailed in this methodology, additional return series versions of the indices may be available, including, but not limited to the following: currency, currency hedged, decrement, fair value, inverse, leveraged, and risk control versions. Index Data

Calculation Return Types

S&P Dow Jones Indices calculates multiple return types which vary based on the treatment of regular cash dividends. The classification of regular cash dividends is determined by S&P Dow Jones Indices.

- Price Return (PR) versions are calculated without adjustments for regular cash dividends.
- Gross Total Return (TR) versions reinvest regular cash dividends at the close on the ex-date without consideration for withholding taxes.
- Net Total Return (NTR) versions, if available, reinvest regular cash dividends at the close on the ex-date after the deduction of applicable withholding taxes.

In the event there are no regular cash dividends on the ex-date, the daily performance of all three indices will be identical.

Index Governance

Index Committee

An S&P Dow Jones Indices Index Committee maintains the indices. The Index Committee meets regularly. All committee members are full-time professional members of S&P Dow Jones Indices' staff. At each meeting, the Index Committee reviews pending corporate actions that may affect index constituents, statistics comparing the composition of the indices to the market, companies that are being considered as candidates for addition to an index, and any significant market events. In addition, the Index Committee may revise index policy covering rules for selecting companies, treatment of dividends, share counts or other matters.

S&P Dow Jones Indices considers information about changes to its indices and related matters to be potentially market moving and material. Therefore, all Index Committee discussions are confidential.

S&P Dow Jones Indices' Index Committees reserve the right to make exceptions when applying the methodology if the need arises. In any scenario where the treatment differs from the general rules stated in this document or supplemental documents, clients will receive sufficient notice, whenever possible.

In addition to the daily governance of indices and maintenance of index methodologies, at least once within any 12-month period, the Index Committee reviews the methodology to ensure the indices continue to achieve the stated objectives, and that the data and methodology remain effective. In certain instances, S&P Dow Jones Indices may publish a consultation inviting comments from external parties.

Performance Disclosure/Back-Tested Data

Where applicable, S&P Dow Jones Indices and its index-related affiliates ("S&P DJI") defines various dates to assist our clients by providing transparency. The First Value Date is the first day for which there is a calculated value (either live or back-tested) for a given index. The Base Date is the date at which the index is set to a fixed value for calculation purposes. The Launch Date designates the date when the values of an index are first considered live: index values provided for any date or time period prior to the index's Launch Date are considered back-tested. S&P DJI defines the Launch Date as the date by which the values of an index are known to have been released to the public, for example via the company's public website or its data feed to external parties. For Dow Jones-branded indices introduced prior to May 31, 2013, the Launch Date (which prior to May 31, 2013, was termed "Date of introduction") is set at a date upon which no further changes were permitted to be made to the index methodology, but that may have been prior to the Index's public release date.

Please refer to the methodology for the Index for more details about the index, including the manner in which it is rebalanced, the timing of such rebalancing, criteria for additions and deletions, as well as all index calculations.

Information presented prior to an index's launch date is hypothetical back-tested performance, not actual performance, and is based on the index methodology in effect on the launch date. However, when creating back-tested history for periods of market anomalies or other periods that do not reflect the general current market environment, index methodology rules may be relaxed to capture a large enough universe of securities to simulate the target market the index is designed to measure or strategy the index is designed to capture. For example, market capitalization and liquidity thresholds may be reduced. In addition, forks have not been factored into the back-test data with respect to the S&P Cryptocurrency Indices. For the S&P Cryptocurrency Top 5 & 10 Equal Weight Indices, the custody element of the methodology was not considered; the back-test history is based on the index constituents that meet the custody element as of the Launch Date. Also, the treatment of corporate actions in back-tested performance may differ from treatment for live indices due to limitations in replicating index management decisions. Back-tested performance reflects application of an index methodology and selection of index constituents with the benefit of hindsight and knowledge of factors that may have positively affected its performance, cannot account for all financial risk that may affect results and may be considered to reflect survivor/look ahead bias. Actual returns may differ significantly from, and be lower than, back-tested returns. Past performance is not an indication or guarantee of future results.

Typically, when S&P DJI creates back-tested index data, S&P DJI uses actual historical constituent-level data (e.g., historical price, market capitalization, and corporate action data) in its calculations. As ESG investing is still in early stages of development, certain datapoints used to calculate certain ESG indices may not be available for the entire desired period of back-tested history. The same data availability issue could be true for other indices as well. In cases when actual data is not available for all relevant historical periods, S&P DJI may employ a process of using "Backward Data Assumption" (or pulling back) of ESG data for the calculation of back-tested historical performance. "Backward Data Assumption" is a process that applies the earliest actual live data point available for an index constituent company to all prior historical instances in the index performance. For example, Backward Data Assumption inherently assumes that companies currently not involved in a specific business activity (also known as "product involvement") were never involved historically and similarly also assumes that companies currently involved in a specific business activity were involved historically too. The Backward Data Assumption allows the hypothetical back-test to be extended over more historical years than would be feasible using only actual data. For more information on "Backward Data Assumption" please refer to the FAQ. The methodology and factsheets of any index that employs backward assumption in the back-tested history

will explicitly state so. The methodology will include an Appendix with a table setting forth the specific data points and relevant time period for which backward projected data was used. Index returns shown do not represent the results of actual trading of investable assets/securities. S&P DJI maintains the index and calculates the index levels and performance shown or discussed but does not manage any assets.

Index returns do not reflect payment of any sales charges or fees an investor may pay to purchase the securities underlying the Index or investment funds that are intended to track the performance of the Index. The imposition of these fees and charges would cause actual and back-tested performance of the securities/fund to be lower than the Index performance shown. As a simple example, if an index returned 10% on a US \$100,000 investment for a 12-month period (or US \$10,000) and an actual asset-based fee of 1.5% was imposed at the end of the period on the investment plus accrued interest (or US \$1,650), the net return would be 8.35% (or US \$8,350) for the year. Over a three-year period, an annual 1.5% fee taken at year end with an assumed 10% return per year would result in a cumulative gross return of 33.10%, a total fee of US \$5,375, and a cumulative net return of 27.2% (or US \$27,200).
